Shoreline Stabilization Grant

In June, the neighborhood received a \$2500 grant for shoreline stabilization. This was one of several Upper White River Watershed Alliance grants that we applied for in March.

The board decided to leverage the grant money to allow more homeowners to take advantage of it. This meant that grant money would be used to subsidize a larger number of shoreline stabilization projects.

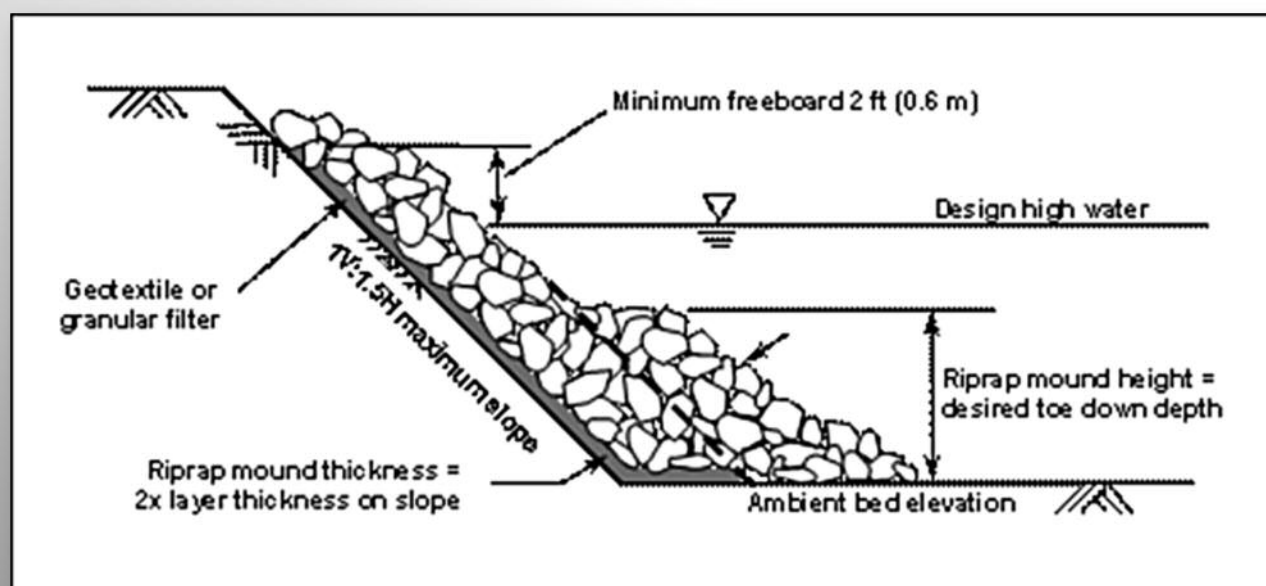
The board examined the shoreline of the entire lake by boat, looking for areas in most need of stabilization.

Homeowners with lake frontage were then contacted by email, and asked to answer questions about their

interest, willingness and ability to contribute some portion of the expense, and the suitability of their shorelines for the intended stabilization method. The board then prioritized project locations by suitability of the shoreline and whether the property owners were in good standing with their assessments.

Permits were approved in early August and work has begun on two properties. Additional properties will be stabilized as grant funds and time allow. We plan to apply for additional grants to continue this program next summer.

Blast From The Past

The Indian Lake Development Company was formed in 1928 for the purpose of creating Indian Lake. Land for the project began being acquired in 1927 by the Northern Investment Company, under Mark Rinehart. A 128.2 acre parcel previously owned by Carl McReynolds provided most of the land. Some of the early players, including Mark Rinehart and Robert Oblinger, became ILIA board members, and were on the board as late as 1947.

The development was platted in three sections in early 1929. The October 1929 stock market crash led to the mortgager, Washington Bank & Trust, falling into receivership in 1930. In 1931, The court reassigned the Indian Lake Development Company mortgage to the Fletcher Savings & Trust Company. Lots would be sold off in the subsequent thirty years.

April 25, 1929	Indian Lake third section plat (containing lots 115 to 197, beach, parks and blocks F to K) recorded.
May 16, 1929	Declarations of Conditions and Restrictions Applicable to Indian Lake Sections One, Two and Three recorded.
May 20, 1929	Indian Lake Improvement Association incorporated, Robert Oblinger president, Mark Rinehart secretary, Ira Minnick treasurer. Annual meetings are to be the second Monday in January of each year.
October 29, 1929	"Black Tuesday" the Wall Street crash of 1929
November 5, 1930	Washington Bank & Trust falls into receivership.
January 26, 1931	Court reassigns Indian Lake Development Company mortgage to Fletcher Savings & Trust Company.

Meet Margaret Mathews



"I'm a simple person," says Margaret Mathews. And after spending an afternoon interviewing her for this article, I think I know what she means. But when she further asserts, "I'm boring," I'm afraid I have to disagree. As Margaret

shared some of her story with me, I realized that the simplicity that she plays down as "boring," is, in actuality, the result of a life carefully crafted to embody all that she is passionate about. Even her home at Indian Lake plays an integral role in those passions.

Born in Ohio, Margaret has lived in a number of places in Connecticut, Colorado and Tennessee as well as Indiana, and never really thought she'd be a Hoosier long-term. Even though she graduated high school and met her husband, Eddie, in Goshen, obtained her Masters of Science in Social Work at the University of Indianapolis, and began her career in Fishers, she was still seriously considering moving back to Colorado.

When given the opportunity to become the youth minister at the United Methodist Church in Fishers, a position that incorporated both her training and her faith, Margaret accepted the job. Since the position came with a parsonage, it gave she and Eddie time to defer their decision about where they would settle down permanently.

Margaret gave birth to their oldest child, Grace, in 2000, and by 2003 she was ready to further unify the elements of her life by staying home to begin home-schooling their daughter. It was time to find the home in which the Mathew's family would grow and learn.

In June of that year, Margaret and Eddie followed a real estate agent up the driveway of a house on Indian Lake Blvd South Drive, on a quest to find the place that felt like home. Margaret remembers the realtor was still trying to fit the key into the lock, when she walked toward the back of the property, looked out over the water and announced to Eddie, "I want to live here. We can live in Indiana."

With those words, the long period of indecision was over and they settled into the Indian Lake Community,

where, in 2006, they increased the size of their home by a few hundred square feet and the size of their family by 2 – TWINS! Michael and Glory.

Today Margaret teaches all three of their children in their Indian Lake home, and given her background in social work and ministry, it is not surprising that part of their children's learning experiences include supporting children through Compassion International, and providing meals to people facing homelessness in downtown Indianapolis. Margaret loves that her children also explore and learn lessons about their natural environment living on the lake. She does not, however, take credit for some of their independent studies of various creatures. In fact, for the purpose of this article, when she consulted Grace about Hunter the Snake who lives under the deck, she was informed that Nate, a 4-foot-long black snake that has taken up residence there, presumably has eaten Hunter. Margaret didn't seem particularly enthusiastic about Nate's presence, but admitted that the kids love him.

It bears mentioning that Margaret is also a personal trainer and has created a business called Real Woman Fitness, through which she specializes in helping women of all fitness levels achieve physical strength and wellness through a program of body-weight exercises and movement, inspired by military boot camp conditioning.

So, it really does appear that Margaret's recipe for a contented life is rather simple.

- Marry the love of your life.
- Settle into the home of your dreams.
- Mix in a generous portion of faith, family and compassion
- Serve with a side of physical wellness.

This was a very busy Summer Season here at the Lake, and with every event, both joyous and sad, it reminds me how blessed we ALL are to live in this tight community!

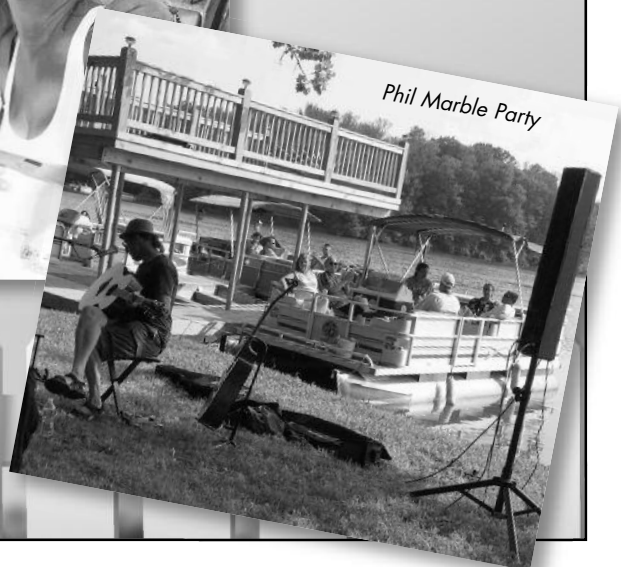

Neighborhood grinder system wiring to be replaced

The electrical structure in the 35-year old grinder system that serves more than 80 homes on and around Indian Lake will be getting a much-needed overhaul. The 59 grinder pumps in the system each work like a miniature lift station. Each pump lifts solid waste and forces it to flow uphill toward a sewage treatment plant.

The grinder system used near Indian Lake has experienced a drop in electrical voltage, problems with splices, unsealed above-ground conduits, rusted and otherwise deteriorated electrical cabinets and broken underground wiring that wasn't installed in conduit pipe.

Crews will replace the existing green cabinet boxes (that are used for pumps that aren't on house power) with gray distribution racks. Nearby homeowners will receive written notice at least 14 days in advance, probably door-to-door; the goal is to begin work on September 1.

"Homeowners won't experience any disruption of service, but they'll know when the project is underway," Utilities Superintendent John Solenberg said. "They'll see work crews in the neighborhood, digging trenches to access the electrical system." The work is expected to last about 90 days.
